The National Science Programs: Taught from a more International approach?

The focal point of IHGR is its determination to be an international school. But what does this position entail, and what essential requirements define the Internationality of a school? At IHGR we have three official Programs; IB, Natural Science and Social Science. Today I would like to investigate how these courses; especially the national ones are influenced by the International environment of our school. In order to make a judgment we shall consider two factors:

Social atmosphere: At IHGR we have 350 students, all together representing more than 40 nationalities worldwide. However, 75% of these students are Swedish native speakers, or speak it fluently, naturally leading to Swedish being the most spoken language in the corridors of our school.

Academic approach: The National and Social Science Programs are specially designed to accumulate an International profile in a domestic environment. The Science Programs make use of GCSE-textbooks in almost all subjects as opposed to textbooks made according to the national program curriculum. Additionally, in subjects such as civics one is briefly introduced to Swedish parties, however deeply engaged in International issues.

The Natural and Social science program are both slightly adapted versions of the traditional Swedish science programs. IHGR is keen on establishing a bilingual atmosphere which will later encourage students to continue their studies in either Sweden or abroad.
